Tri-state meeting with IOU and SDOU coming up fast

If last year's spring meeting (125th anniversary in Lincoln) wasn't big enough, the spring meeting this year may even be bigger and more exciting, if that is even possible. We are having a joint meeting with the lowa and South Dakota Ornithologists' Unions in South Sioux City 16-18 May. The meeting will be held at the Salvation Army Western Plains Camp located at 570 152nd St, South Sioux City, NE 68776.

While the meeting location will be in Nebraska, there will be field trips in all three states. Thus, folks will not only have the opportunity to add a few county ticks in Nebraska but also state ticks in nearby lowa and South Dakota. Furthermore, it will be a tremendous opportunity to make new friends from adjacent states. Saturday evening will feature a keynote by Nebraska's own Michael Forsberg (https://www.michaelforsberg.com/). Michael is a celebrated photographer, author, and conservationist who has dedicated over three decades to capturing and telling the story of wildlife and conservation in the Great Plains through his work. He has very recently published a new book, *Into Whooperland*, that tells the story of the endangered Whooping Crane. Copies of the book will be available during the meeting!



The Salvation Army Western Plains Camp is located on Highway 20 just west of Highway 77 and Highway 20 interchange. The entrance to the camp is not obvious. 2025 Big Year – First Quarter Leaders

The 2025 Nebraska 300 Big Year is well underway with some very fine rarities, so it's time to review the Q1 scores and reports. It's no secret that Tobin Brown is going for even bigger numbers this year on the heels of his remarkable 325 species "rookie" campaign in 2024. Starting off hot on January 1 (see below), he is slightly ahead of pace with Paul

A few of last year's rarities hung around to join the "best birds so far" list of 2025. <u>Couch's Kingbird</u> (North Platte, Lincoln Co.), <u>Eurasian Wigeon</u> (Lake Ogallala, Keith Co.), <u>Barrow's Goldeneye</u> (North Platte Water Treatment Plant, Lincoln Co) and yet another <u>Brant</u> from Jacob "Brantman" Cooper (Kearney, Buffalo Co) were New Year's Day beauties. Jacob also found a January 2nd <u>Orange-crowned Warbler</u>...not a rare species, but only the 7th Nebraska winter record (Buffalo Co). Tobin and Keegan Brown added a surprise 8th Spring record <u>Pacific Loon</u> at Sutherland Reservoir (Lincoln Co) on March 1st that hung out for 2-3 days before a big winter storm presumably sent it flapping.



<u>Sandhill</u> and <u>Whooping Crane</u> migration through Nebraska gets all the press, but will the <u>Common Crane</u> become a lowkey Nebraska specialty for ABA Listers? Listed as an American Birding Association (ABA) Code 4-Casual, it's a) rare enough to show up on the alerts with the 'mega' rarities b) a REALLY good bird and c) Nebraska and South Dakota have the only ABA records in 2025. It is also listed as "casual" (2-7 of the last 10 years) by the NOU Records Committee. However, due to a combination of observer skill, luck, fortunate location and forces we may never understand, Nebraska birders have documented sightings 5 of the past 7 years, see <u>COMMON CRANE – Birds of Nebraska – Online</u>.

This be a record-setting year for Common Crane in NE, topping the 2 (maybe 3) birds in 2021. The first one was found by Andrew Furman near Grand Island on 3/17 (Merrick Co across the river from the 2023 location). A second bird near Gibbon on 3/23 (Buffalo Co) could be the same bird found near Elm Creek 3/28-3/31 (Buffalo Co). Much farther west the crane at Clear Creek WMA 3/24-3/28 (Keith Co) stood out in a smaller crowd of Sandhills giving the closest looks and pics (see photo) from the comfort of a picnic table. We'll never know for sure, but were there 3, 4 or even more? How many others were out there hiding in those record-breaking flocks of <u>Sandhill Cranes</u>? Will Nebraska birders continue to find them (nearly) annually and raise the profile of this rarity?
